I don't know how to introduce this - I GOT TO INTERVIEW MICHAEL TWITTY!!!

We talked for so long that I was able to break the discussion into two episodes. This is part one, in which we talk DNA and how it doesn't serve Black researchers, writing as a protection of memory the ultimate smallness of the world, human interconnectedness, and many aspects of Blackness as they relate to power and powerlessness – ultimately, finding the power in self-knowledge, including the ugly stuff. please let me know what you think, and after this ep, listen for the next one – that will be part two of this amazing discussion.

Hello, and welcome to episode 402 of From Paper To People, genealogy's answer to the eternal question, "What's your story?" My name is Carolynn ni Lochlainn, and I am your hostess with the mostest. This is a very exciting episode for me – as I stated in the promo a little over a week ago, I had the extreme honor of talking with Michael Twitty, a cultural and culinary historian whose masterwork, "The Cooking Gene," has helped to raise the consciousness of a nation to issues of Blackness, Whiteness, Southernness, Americanness, and so much more.
